CCOTTISH COUNTRY DANCING AND MUSIC began in Boston in 1947 With Edinburgh-born Jeannie Robertson Buchanan Carmichael as teacher and mentor. In April 1950, Boston was granted the first overseas Branch status by the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society. Since then the Branch has grown to include some 325 members, twenty classes in five states, fifty-two certificated teachers, and a long roster of musicians and bands associated with the Branch.

The Boston Branch has long fostered and encouraged dance musicians. In 1974, the Branch sponsored a music weekend featuring band leader and fiddler Angus MacKinnon and vocalist Jean Redpath. A number of workshop participants subsequently brought their inspiration to many Branch activities and to other interested musicians. Pinewoods Camp, the Boston Branch Demonstration Team, the Burns Night concerts, the performing group the New Caledonians, Branch dance parties and balls, the Boston Scottish Fiddle Club, and many other Scottish events and gatherings in New England served to stir musicians' ideas. Today the Boston Branch takes great pride in a veritable musical soup of informal musical ensembles and formal bands with a constantly changing landscape of personalities and instrumental surprises.

This CD and its companion book of original dances composed by and for members of the Boston Branch is a celebration of fifty years of dancing, memories, friendship, and a deep cultural affinity for the music and dance of Scotland.

We hope that you enjoy the music and dances as much as we enjoyed compiling them. They are proof that Scottish Country Dancing is a vigorous art, alive and well in Boston and around the world. Susan Worland is a leading folk dance fiddler who has worked with Marianne Taylor in many diverse and interesting venues. Susan and Beth have often delighted Boston area dancers with their rich and flowing treatment of Scottish Country Dance music. The Boston Branch will miss Susan since her move to Berkeley, California, last year. The dance was inspired by the title tune, dedicated to Marianne and Capt. Don Gorman.

Local Hero was founded by Susie Petrov and Norb Spencer in 1987. Susie is pianist and arranger for the band, which has played from Montreal to Atlanta to Scotland and whose members have produced several CDs. Susie has functioned as both musician and Scottish Country Dance teacher in many places in North America and in the United Kingdom and was the first American pianist chosen to play at the Summer School at St. Andrews, Scotland. The members of Local Hero enjoy weaving their contrasting instrumental voices in ever-changing textures.

Lezlie Webster is a championship piper, Highland dance adjudicator, and founder of the New Hampshire School of Scottish Arts. She has taught and performed for the Branch at Pinewoods, the Boston Highland Ball and Burns Nights. The idea of Pipes Awa' came originally from Evelyn Murray, and the expanded group recorded their CD, Pipes Awa' wi' the Fiddle, in 1989. The title tune was written by Jeanetta McColl's father.

Anne Hooper wrote the title tune to go with the dance and put together a small ensemble to play her arrangement. Jacqueline has performed several times in Anne's annual violin recital, a favorite event for her Scottish dance friends and classical music colleagues alike. Anne and Hanneke have performed together for the annual Boston Branch concert and at Pinewoods. Together the three of them enjoy flexing their technical and improvisational muscles.

He has been active for many years as a Branch dance teacher, Highland dancer, and musician and was a founding member of the New Caledonians performing group. Duncan visits Boston whenever he can to renew friendships and musical ties. Duncan and Beth have enjoyed exploring the piano duo possibilities of Scottish dance music for many years, and they are also both past presidents of the Branch.

The White Cockade is the Boston area's longest established band, formed in 1972 by Sylvia Miskoe and Cal Howard. Bert Murray, of Aberdeen, Scotland, sent Sylvia the tune dedicated to her just at the time she was looking for tunes for the dance. He received an M.B.E. this year for services to Scottish traditional music. Sylvia has been active in the area as a Scottish Country Dance teacher and as a contra dance musician and caller for many years. The White Cockade has played for many events in the Northeast and has several recordings to its credit.

The Strathspey & Reel Society of New Hampshire was founded in 1988 by Barbara McOwen, Sylvia Miskoe, and Marianne Taylor. It is an open group which welcomes all ages, all levels, and all instruments. The SRSNH has played for several Boston Branch events, has produced a number of annual gala concerts, and toured Scotland in 1996. Barbara is the music director for the group and wrote the title tune to commemorate the annual Boston Branch concerts in Sanders Theater, Cambridge, 1979–1994. This unique orchestral sound was recorded at the home of former Boston Branch president Deborah Hawkins, where all the dance submissions for this anniversary project were danced and thoroughly tested by many dedicated Branch members.

This dance and its title tune were composed for Earl Gaddis, fiddler for the Northampton group established by Virginia Van Scoy. The musicians wanted this track to capture the passionate richness of on-the-spot improvisation and the excitement of spontaneous interaction, so they decided not to play Earl's arrangement together prior to the moment of actually recording it. This is their first appearance as an ensemble. Earl and Karen are also widely known as English Country Dance musicians, and they impart a touch of that flavor in their complex voicings.

Ed Pearlman wrote the title tune for this dance, devised by Alan and Lydia Smith, for the twenty-fifth anniversary ball of the Concord Scottish Country Dancers in 1985. Ed has played often for Boston Branch dances and performances, and established the Branch's Music Committee and Pinewoods Music Book. He is a fiddler, teacher, and judge and directed the Boston Scottish Fiddle Club for eighteen years. Ed and Beth formed a duo in 1982 and recorded their dancing and listening album, Boston Hospitality, in 1986. They have played together periodically ever since.

The Carfuffle Ceilidh Band features an instrumentation and style currently heard in Scotland and Canada, though unusual in Boston. Four members of the band are also certificated Scottish Country Dance teachers, and Robert McOwen is co-director of the Boston Branch Demonstration Team. Robert and the team devised the dance in honor of Latvian-born Izolde Lamont, a long-time Boston Branch dancer, teacher, and generous hostess.

Tom Pixton is active in the traditional folk dance scene as a band leader, accordionist, recording producer, and music publisher. He has played for Scottish Country Dancing since 1992. Tom also composes tunes and chose the title tune from his own original tune collection. Previous to his accordion career he was an internationally known concert harpsichordist.

Tullochgorum is a Scottish Country Dance band founded by Barbara and Robert McOwen in 1980. Barbara was the first Music Director for the summer school at Pinewoods Camp and for the annual Branch concerts. She has actively promoted live music for Boston Branch classes and parties. Tullochgorum has played for many major events in North America, has toured in Scotland, and has recorded an album. The members of Tullochgorum have always loved the power of strathspeys.

Sprig of Ivy is a Boston-based ensemble first conceived at Pinewoods Scottish dance camp in 1996 with the express purpose of promoting Highland bagpipes for country dancing. Terry Traub's arrangement of favorite traditional tunes uses the pipes to good advantage. Terry plays the piano, accordion, and fiddle with equal flair and has been known to pick up the trumpet. Matt Petrie, whose family comes from Cape Breton, plays fiddle with the band when not playing pipes.

Both Anne and Hanneke are U.S. National Scottish Fiddle Champions. These three superh musicians probe the infinities of the romantic waltz to close our Boston Branch musical offering.
