## Annual Report

IN the year since the last report was published, the major event within the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society has been the much-regretted retirement of our former Secretary, Miss Muriel F. Hadden. Tributes to her efficiency and kindly helpfulness have been received from members all over the world. Her valuable work for the Society is gratefully acknowledged by all, from Miss Milligan herself to the newest and youngest member. We cordially wish her many years of happy leisure.

The appointment of a successor to Miss Hadden was no easy task, but we have been fortunate in securing the services of Miss Eleanor R. Grubb. Already our new Secretary has shown her ability to deal with the complex business of the Society. We welcome her, hoping she will soon feel at home with the work and us.

A change of Secretary in a Society as large as ours might have caused a much greater upheaval but for the helpfulness and steady work of the other two ladies at Headquarters, Miss Erskine and Mrs. Simpson, to whom our thanks are due.

While the aims of the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society are being enthusiastically pursued by members and teachers throughout the world, special mention should be made of the part played by Mrs. Florence Lesslie. Letters expressing gratitude and appreciation of her help are constantly arriving from Australia and New Zealand. To members in these far-away Branches, she is not only a friend in need, but a living link with the parent body.

**Annual General Meeting and Autumn School**—The thirty-seventh A.G.M. was held in Stirling on Saturday, 5th November, 1966. On Friday, 4th November, a Ball was held and on Saturday morning members attended a General Class in Albert Hall. Office-bearers and Executive Council members were entertained to lunch by Stirling Branch before the Annual General Meeting on Saturday afternoon. An informal dance was held in the evening.

The Executive Council wish to express their appreciation to the Branch for the excellent arrangements and generous hospitality received during their stay.

**Membership**—The Society now has 99 Branches and 254 Affiliated Groups. During the year a Branch was formed in Herefordshire. Total membership remains in the region of 18,000.

**Subscription Copy**—The subscription copy for 1967-68 will be Book 23—a collection of newly composed dances in traditional form. This will be given to members on payment of their annual subscription which became due on 1st July, 1967.

**Examinations**—The following Branches put forward candidates for the Society's examinations: Belfast, Dundee, Edinburgh, Glasgow, Leeds, London, New Zealand, North West Ayrshire, Southport, Sydney.

Examinations were also conducted in Aberdeen College of Education; Callender Park College of Education; Canberra; Craigie College

of Education, Ayr; Craiglockhart R.C. Training College, Edinburgh; Dunfermline College of Physical Education, Edinburgh; Hamilton College of Education; Ilkley College of Education; Jordanhill College of Education, Glasgow; Malvern Scots Club; Moray House Training College, Edinburgh; Melbourne; Newcastle; Australia; Notre Dame R.C. College of Education, Glasgow; Stone, Staffs.; and St. Andrews Summer School.

In the Preliminary Test 296 candidates gained passes. There were 57 failures. Teacher's Certificates were awarded to 120 candidates, failures numbered 21.

**Summer School**—The Society's Summer School was held in University Hall, St. Andrews, from 17th July to 14th August. Every available place was taken up during the entire course, with overseas Branches and affiliated groups well represented among the 230 students attending each week.

The Executive Council again takes the opportunity of thanking Miss Milligan and her staff of teachers and pianists for their work during the four weeks of the School.

### Miss M. F. Hadden

It is always sad when it comes to the end of "an auld sang" and now Miss Hadden who has exercised her benign influence over us since 1937 has left us.

Miss Hadden was loved by many and admired and respected by all known and unknown to her. ## Minutes of Annual General Meeting,

5th November, 1966

**MINUTES of the Thirty-Seventh Annual General Meeting** held on Saturday, 5th November, 1966, at 2.30 p.m., in the Albert Hall, Stirling.

**Present.**—Major-General Lord Thurlow, C.B., C.B.E., D.S.O., President, Miss J. C. Milligan, Vice-President, and an approximate attendance of 375 members of whom 97 were delegates.

Before the business of the meeting Lord Thurlow read a message from Her Majesty the Queen, thanking the Society for its loyal greetings, and a further letter thanking the Secretary for a copy of the bulletin which had been sent to her. A message was also read from Mrs. Stewart of Fasnacloch, co-founder of the Society.

**Chairman's Remarks.**—Lord Thurlow began his remarks by welcoming the delegates from fifty-seven Branches and members who had come to support the work of the Society at the Annual Meeting. Lord Thurlow gave a special welcome to the delegates from the first European Branch, Hague and District, and wished all good fortune to the Branch in Holland. The President went on to say how grateful he was to the Chairman, Mr. Proudfoot, Miss Bowie and the Committee of Stirling Branch for making this weekend in the ancient Capital of Scotland not only possible but obviously successful. He paid tribute to the work of the Branch Officials and members of the Executive and other Committees, without whose work everything would come to a grinding halt. Lord Thurlow expressed the need to encourage new Branches and new members, particularly the younger members, and said it was up to us all to maintain and spread Scottish Country Dancing in the face of the new crazes which every year brings, and to maintain the high standards on which we must insist. Lord Thurlow paid tribute to Miss Milligan for her devotion, energy and hard work, the "Petronella Pan" of the Society, and also to Miss Hadden for her wonderfully efficient work at Headquarters. In concluding the President announced that the next Annual General Meeting would be held in Oban and he thanked the Lorn (Argyll) Branch for their kind invitation.

**Minutes.**—The Minutes of the Annual General Meeting held on 6th November, 1965, having been circulated in the Bulletin, were approved and signed.

**Confirmation of Appointment of President and Honorary Vice-Presidents.**—Miss Milligan proposed the confirmation of the appointment of Major-General Lord Thurlow as President of the Society and The Countess of Galloway, Mrs. Stewart of Fasnacloch, The Duke of Hamilton, K.T., The Duke of Atholl and Miss Gray-Buchanan as

Honorary Vice-Presidents. This was seconded by Miss Adams and unanimously approved.

**Election of Office-Bearers and Six Elected Members.**—*Chairman:* Miss Adams was elected for this office, being the sole nominee. *Vice-Chairman:* Mr. Lochhead was elected for this office, being the sole nominee. *Six Elected Members:* the following were elected by vote: Mr. Clement (Dumfries), Mr. Cross (Glasgow), Mr. Ireland (London), Miss Martin (Aberdeen), Mr. Mechan (Dundee) and Mrs. Parker (Ayr).

**Adoption of Annual Report.**—The adoption of the Annual Report was proposed by Mr. Corbett (Newcastle-on-Tyne), seconded by Mrs. Couper (Dunfermline) and approved by the Meeting.

**Adoption of the Accounts.**—The audited accounts for the year ended 30th June, 1966, circulated with the Bulletin, were presented by Mr. Lochhead, Convener of the Finance Committee. Before asking for approval and their adoption, Mr. Lochhead drew attention to one or two items. Turning first to the Revenue Account, subscriptions were about the same as in the previous year, but larger premises enabled more members to attend the 1965 Summer School. This accounted for the higher income. Royalties were lower, partly because no new book was published and partly because sales of the Society's books generally had declined. A surplus of £307 was made in 1965/66 as compared with £759 in the previous year.

On the expenditure side, it was noteworthy that the smaller Bulletin had caused a saving in spite of the steep rise in Printers' costs. After allocating £500 to the Staff Fund and £100 to General Reserve, the balance carried to the Balance Sheet was £16.

Turning to the Balance Sheet, Mr. Lochhead reported that Life Membership income continued to expand. The fund now stood at £2,567. With reference to the Auditors' Certificate, Mr. Lochhead expressed gratitude on behalf of the Society to Mr. Norman MacKinnon of Messrs. Norman MacKinnon and Co., Ayr, who had been the Society's Auditor for so many years. He was not seeking re-election and the Society would like to place on record its debt to him, particularly in the early years when he gave so much practical assistance.

Mr. Lochhead drew attention to the estimates for 1966/67, which formed a useful guide for the Finance Committee during the year.

Mr. A. I. Cameron (Lorn, Argyll) proposed and Mr. Middleton (Glasgow) seconded the adoption of the accounts and estimates, and these were unanimously approved by the Meeting.

**To Confirm the Appointment of the Auditors.**—The confirmation of the appointment of the Auditors, Messrs. Arthur Walker & Co., Edinburgh, was proposed by Mr. J. B. C. Brown (Edinburgh), seconded by Mr. Sinclair (Arbroath) and approved by the Meeting.

**Resolutions.—****(a) From N.W. Ayrshire Branch.**

1. "That Headquarters should be prepared to accept deficit of any Branch that runs the Annual General Meeting of the Society."

The resolution was proposed by Dr. Currie (N.W. Ayrshire) and seconded by Dr. A. M. Meston (N.W. Ayrshire). An amendment was moved by Miss Galloway (Ayr) and seconded by Mr. Ferguson (Ayr) to the effect that "The Executive Council should be responsible for any deficit incurred by a Branch staging the Annual General Meeting, up to a sum to be agreed between the Executive Council and the Finance Committee." On the amendment being put to the vote by a show of hands, it was carried.

2. "That Resolutions should be asked for earlier."

The President ruled that this Resolution should not be accepted as it required a change in the Constitution, of which notice had not been given.

3. "That the General Purposes Committee or the Executive Council should review all matters raised in Open Forum and see if worthy of further consideration." The Resolution was proposed by Dr. Currie (N.W. Ayrshire) and seconded by Dr. A. M. Meston (N.W. Ayrshire). A direct negative to the Resolution was moved by Mr. Brown (Edinburgh) and seconded by Mr. Falconer (Edinburgh). After a vote by show of hands the Resolution was carried.

**(b) From Dundee Branch.**

"Whilst appreciating the necessity for Public Liability Insurance, it is proposed that payment of the Premium should be met by Headquarters."

Lord Thurlow told the meeting that the Finance Committee that morning had given consideration to this Resolution and had agreed to recommend that all Branches in the U.K. should have the Public Liability Insurance Premium paid by Headquarters. The President then invited Dundee Branch to withdraw their Resolution, which they did.

**1967 Annual General Meeting.**—The President confirmed that the Executive Council had accepted with pleasure an invitation from Lorn (Argyll) Branch to hold the Annual General Meeting in Oban on 28th October, 1967.

**Vote of Thanks.**—A vote of thanks was proposed by Mr. Ireland (London) to Lord Thurlow for presiding at the Meeting, to Miss Adams for her Chairmanship of the Society during the year, to the Provost and Town Council for their Civic Reception, to Stirling Branch for their hospitality during the weekend, and to Miss Milligan and Miss Hadden for their work during the year.

**Obituaries****Mrs. MARY ISDALE MACNAB**

Everyone who knew her mourned the death of Mrs. Mary Isdale MacNab of Vancouver.

Mrs. MacNab was a very loyal and deeply interested member of the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society. Her own metier was Highland Dancing but she had real feeling also for our Ballroom type of dancing.

I remember Mrs. MacNab coming to see me long before the war on one of her visits to her native country, to hear about the Society. Since then, she has come quite frequently to St. Andrews and in Vancouver organised a class for Scottish Country Dancing.

Mrs. MacNab is well known to the R.S.C.D.S. members through the traditional Scottish Dances collected by her and given most generously to her friends in Britain. These dances, while not of the traditional longwise Ballroom pattern but more of the Quadrille type, were much enjoyed by Scottish Country Dancers, both as studies and as demonstration dances.

How Mrs. MacNab enjoyed the Summer School. She had a great sense of humour and never missed a point in the fun made at parties and ceilidhs. She was a real character and we shall miss her.

**Miss JEANNIE CARMICHAEL**

(Died 6th September, 1966)

It is nearly twenty years since I met Miss Carmichael at St. Andrews. She had come to the School from Boston to find out how to "teach Scottish dances properly" and when she went back to the States she was the founder of all the wide-spread Scottish dancing in U.S.A. That was typical of her; in all the years I knew her she never failed to give help and support to all who asked her, no matter from where they came.

When I had the pleasure of staying with her in Boston, over ten years ago, I was most agreeably surprised by the extent of the knowledge she had imparted and by the degree of efficiency that her classes had attained.

She ran the Boston training weekend at Long Pond which people of all types and from all the airts attended and so was the means of introducing our dances, as far West as Dayton, Ohio.

Her passing is to me a great personal loss and I know that, although by reason of her work in astronomy, she had to become an American citizen, she remained at heart a Scotswoman, born and bred, with a deep sense of the value of the traditions and customs of her native land.

Corson from Edinburgh in October. Eight candidates, instructed by Mrs. Cecil McCausland, gained their Teacher's Certificate. After an arduous year, a very happy class welcomed Miss Milligan in April for the examination.

**Birmingham** Branch has again increased its membership. The autumn and spring Balls, monthly socials and annual non-competitive festival were held and well supported. The Week-end Course at Lilleshall and the Day School were full. Open-air dancing sessions in the Birmingham Parks and a social at Hidcote Manor (in the Cotswolds) were again successful. **Cheltenham** Branch held a Presentation Dance in May to mark the departure of Miss Isobel Ferrier, a former Branch Secretary—she will be very much missed. Several members attended Mr. John Gradon's Preliminary Test Class at Malvern and the examination was conducted by Miss Milligan in March. Once more Mr. and Mrs. A. Grant were the teachers at a most enjoyable week-end school.

**Dumfries** Branch reports a most successful and enjoyable season, with demonstration teams being kept busy and socials a great success.

**Dunbartonshire West** Branch reports a most successful year, their programme including a well attended Junior Dance, Annual Ball and Couples Ball. Several new clubs and classes, outwith the Branch, have been started in their scattered district, and the enthusiasm for Scottish Country Dancing is being maintained. The Annual Charity Dance realised £123 in aid of "Guide Dogs for the Blind." Miss Allie Anderson and Mr. Douglas Henderson were teachers at a well-attended week-end school in February. Social dances attracted members and friends from neighbouring Branches.

**Dunfermline** Branch enjoyed a visit from 13 members of The Hague District Branch, who were spending a week-end in Dunfermline en route to the Summer School in St. Andrews. On arrival they were entertained to an informal dance, and the following day enjoyed a picnic, in fine weather, at one of the local beauty spots. In an effort to attract more members for the coming session, it has been decided to hold a General Social Class, as against a purely instructional class. There will be one hour of instruction with a break for tea, followed by an hour of social dancing.

**Forres** Branch membership has remained steady and the attendance at the Annual Rally, Christmas and End-of-Season Socials was encouraging. Mrs. M. Corson instructed at our third Week-end School in April and plans are being made for a similar course in April, 1968.

**Glasgow** Branch reports an unchanged programme of winter activities, but experimented in the spring classes with a class for members considering application for the Society's Certificate. Full Certificate classes were very successful. The Annual and Spring Balls were both well attended. Unfortunately, Miss Milligan was unable to be present at the Spring Ball, but a great welcome was accorded the other Guest of Honour, Miss Hadden, and most sincere good wishes were extended on this particular day, which coincided with her official retiral. Many social activities were held to raise funds to entertain the French team, who were hosts to the Branch team last summer. The usual week-end school at the Palace of Art was most successful and members from other Branches are welcome to attend the week-end in December, 1967.

The Hague District Branch took part in the following events: eight demonstrations for various organisations, the Queen's Birthday procession in The Hague with a float and demonstration for the Mayor of The Hague, also five week-ends in the Youth Hostel near The Hague and St. Andrews and Burns's week-end. Weekly classes were held and a monthly course for Preliminary candidates. A donation was received from an organisation in the cultural field, which was used to get evening outfits for the demonstration team. A Burns Supper and Dance was held on 29th January at the International Institute and in April classes were conducted by C. Stewart Smith from San Francisco. Mornington Peninsula Branch numbers are increasing and the enthusiasm of new members is very encouraging. At the recent Autumn School in Melbourne, one member successfully completed the Teacher's Certificate. A demonstration team, under the able guidance of Mr. Kevin Connolly, was asked to appear with Andy Stewart and Jimmy Shand on their recent visit to Melbourne and also appeared in a Scottish programme on T.V.

Fifteen candidates passed. Next autumn members look forward to celebrating the 21st anniversary of the founding of this Branch.

Much has been said about the activities of the Stirlingshire Branch this past year, but special mention must be made of the Annual General Meeting of the Society held in Stirling in November, 1966. It was in the 1930's that this was talked of first and due to various factors it was thirty years before the Stirlingshire Branch were able to invite the Executive Council to hold their A.G.M. and Autumn School in the Royal Burgh of Stirling. The week-end proved most successful and the Chairman and office-bearers felt that the hard work put in not only by them but by all members was well worthwhile. Tees-side membership again broke the record. Successful classes at three levels. Monthly social dances. Non-competitive Festival a sell-out. Using a huge barn as protection against the weather, a most successful Scottish Country Dance Barbecue was held during the season.

Will you, won't you, will you, won't you, join the dance? Although Alice may have been perplexed in her Wonderland, an answer in the affirmative is in the minds of the many hundreds who, at the turn of the year, cast their thoughts to the next Summer School—

"St. Andrews by the northern sea,  
A haunted town it is to me."

From legends we learn that St. Andrews is possessed of a prodigious number of supernatural appearances of different kinds, sizes and shapes—most of them of an awe-inspiring and blood-curdling type. These include the Dancing Skeleton, and Jock the Piper, who, on a dark New Year's night marched into a mysterious cavern in the cliffs, and was last heard playing his pipes merrily, whilst passing beneath Market

Street. The Summer School, now in its thirty-sixth year, has indeed a strong link with the town, and the reveilles so stirringly played to we ordinary mortals and attributed to Bobby Watson, Bill Clements or Tom Leggett, may in fact have been rendered by Piper Jock himself!

A pleasant surprise was in store for those who arrived for the first week, and received a welcome from Miss Hadden who stayed for a few days to initiate Miss Grubb, her charming successor, to the procedures of the Summer School. Miss Hadden rendered an invaluable service to the spirit and traditions of the Society, and it is a matter for rejoicing that she will always be with us in the guise of the Jig, Reel, and Strathspey which have been endowed with her name.

That good Scots noun—the Spurtle—has appeared in a new form this year as the title of a progressionary figure from a dance in the New Book. Miss Milligan explained that it is a wooden stick with a carved thistle on the top which is used for stirring the porridge. Group Captain Huxley subsequently presented Miss Milligan with such a utensil! This is the ultimate deterrent—future students behave or you will surely be palmed with a "Spurtle"! Titles of dances can be a wee bit puzzling, and in referring to the New Book it is worth mentioning that the title word "Swilcan" must not be taken too literally. Golfing enthusiasts will, of course, know that it is the name of the burn which winds its way across the famous Old Course of St. Andrews. No doubt this burn has been given other names by those who are obliged to use the fishing nets provided!

As is customary, the buzz of conversation in the dining-room and in the University precincts, included a continental flavour added to Commonwealth accents. Our good friends came from France under the lead of Mme. Chamoin, and from Holland with Mr. Van Zon. The rumour that the French party were responsible for singing "La Marseillaise" after lights out must be scotched, for it was rather hard on those patriots who were obliged to rise from their beds a l'attention in the wee sma' hours!

A whole host of superlatives are needed to describe those who contribute to the enjoyment of a Summer School, and to quote from Bobby Watson who praised the pianists before delighting us all with his version of the "Irish Washerwoman"—"They know what they're doing, and it is up to the performers to follow."

Group Captain Huxley, our Fear-an-Tighe, was as masterful as ever in producing a feast of entertainment at the Ceilidh, even to the extent

of persuading Miss Milligan to sing, teach, and then cox the singing of Mingualay. University Hall was almost borne away to the Minch by the vigour of 250 rowers!

Bill Hamilton, our distinguished M.C., together with the Olympians, stimulated all into "controlled abandon" at the Younger Hall dance, and perhaps the following poesy will depict the entertainments:—
