Embassy Records are proud to bring out the second long-playing record made by the Band of the 1st Battalion of the Liverpool Scottish, a valiant and honoured echelon of the British Army. You can hear now this triumphant and glorious music of Scotland, just as it is played at exhibitions or for competition dancing.

The Liverpool Scottish has a long and distinguished record. It first came into being just more than 100 years ago, when Queen Victoria signified acceptance of a Corps of

Volunteers under the title "Liverpool Scottish Rifle Volunteers (XIX Lancashire)".

Absorbed temporarily into the Liverpool Rifles, it was not until 1900 that the regiment was established under its present title, selecting the Forbes tartan as a compliment to its first commanding officer, Colonel Forbes Bell.

It was to the airs you hear now that the Liverpool Scottish went to war in 1914. It was while serving as medical officer to the regiment that Captain Noel Chevasse of the Royal Army Medical Corps became one of those few legendary soldiers whose valour has twice won them that most glorious award, the Victoria Cross.

Several Highland regiments have from time to time provided the regular staff for the Liverpool Scottish, but by the 1930s a particular liaison had been established with the King's Own Cameron Highlanders. In 1936 this was given official recognition and

the Liverpool Scottish formally relinquished its affiliation with the King's Regiment. It is now a Territorial battalion of the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders.

In the 1939-45 war, the Liverpool Scottish was not called upon to go to war as a battalion. Instead, it acted as a training battalion for leaders and sent to the Camerons and other regiments men who worthily upheld a famous name. The Liverpool Scottish also formed a Commando troop.

The Glendaruel Highlanders which has proved to many enemies a frightening deterrent. With the Strathspey The Standard on the Braes O' Mar and the march Mhairi Ban Og, Pipe Major S. Davey is magnificent in piping.
